Holly Sampson, our School Therapist, led an insightful workshop on November 21st focused on managing worries and anxieties. During the session, participants explored the importance of allowing children to ex-

press themselves and their emotions freely. Holly emphasized that children should be encouraged to identify and label their feelings, as this helps them better understand and manage their emotions. By communicating their feelings to a trusted adult, children can receive the support they need. The feedback from the session was overwhelmingly positive, with many attendees expressing appreciation for the valuable strategies shared. Coffee Morning: African families



Parents from African backgrounds were invited to connect with other families in the school who share a similar cultural heritage. This initiative aimed to create a comfortable, communityoriented environment. It offered parents the opportunity to build relation-

Bug Club Workshop

They also received helpful resources to further aid their child's reading journey. It was wonderful to see so many Reception parents eager to learn more ways to support their children's reading at home. Parent Volunteers Workshop

On December 12th, Mrs Rahman, one of the school's Deputy Headteachers delivered a workshop for those interested in becoming a parent volunteer on school trips. During the session, she explained the roles and responsibilities of trip volunteers and their important role in supporting health and safety. Oracy workshop

We recently held a creative Oracy workshop for parents, where we promoted the importance of Oracy in building children's confidence and giving them a voice. The session helped parents learn ways to support their child's oracy and also shared how we use targets in school to support the children becoming confident speakers. The workshop included interactive activities, where parents engaged in discussions on various topics and had the opportunity to speak in groups of 3. They learned tips on how to make storytelling more creative, connected with one another, and shared experiences. We also shared strategies to support EAL children and tips for practicing Oracy at home. Parents left with helpful resources, including discussion questions, debate cards, and question prompts to use at home. Thank you to everyone who joined us for this valuable session. We look forward to seeing the impact of all this additional practice at home on the children's progress. Keep up the great work!

Year 6 Puberty WorkshopMr Heighington & Mrs Bowley provided onsite and online workshops for year 6 parents before the delivery of lessons to pupils. This allowed parents to ask questions and to view the resources we planned to use. Following the statutory requirements, the year 6 puberty lesson is taught to support the wellbeing of boys and girls, helping them to understand the changes that happen to their body as they grow. A separate lesson on conception is also delivered, however parents are able to choose to withdraw their child from this session.

Parenting Course

On December 4th, Forida and the School Social Worker, Shannaz Choudhury, delivered a parenting course focused on boundaries, routines, and positive behaviour. The session provided parents with practical strategies for establishing healthy boundaries and consistent routines, while also addressing effective behaviour techniques. This course aimed to empower parents with the tools and knowledge to support their children's development and well-being in a positive and structured environment. Those who attended felt it was useful, as it allowed them to share experiences and take away ideas.

Thank you to all the parents who completed the 6-week ESOL course. Class have been taking place every Monday and Thursday from 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM in the Community Room, delivered by Twinn. NHS Pharmacy First Service What is Pharmacy First?

The NHS-funded service enables children and adults to get convenient access to advice and treatment where appropriate for seven common conditions, without the potential delay of having to wait for a GP appointment. Accessing the service may mean that children feel better and get back to school as quickly as possible, as well as supporting parents/carers to also get better if they are unwell with one of the conditions covered under the service. There is no need to make an appointment; parents or carers can pop into their local pharmacy with their child and just ask for help. This service supports with the following conditions for people in the age groups specified below:

- ★ Earache (aged 1 to 17 years)
- **→ Impetigo** (aged 1 year and over)
- **→ Infected insect bites and stings** (aged 1 year and over)
- ★ Sore throats (aged 5 years and over)
- **→ Sinusitis** (aged 12 years and over)
- → Uncomplicated urinary tract infections (UTIs) in women (aged 16 to 64 years)
- + Shingles (aged 18 years and over)

Should the pharmacist be unable to help, they will direct the patient to their GP surgery or another healthcare professional, as appropriate.

They then produced a film clip in which they explained why they loved this book so much. The award ceremony took place on Friday 29th November at Genesis Cinema, where the children got to meet all the authors of the nominated books. There was much excitement as the winning book was announced: it was "Final year" by Matt Goodfellow, a poetic story about a boy's last year in primary school. As part of the event, there was also a screening of the film the children had produced—the author loved it so much that she asked the school's permission to use the film to promote her book. YEAR 5 & 6 Online Safety Workshop

Year 5 and 6 recently took part in an important workshop on how to stay safe online. Two local Police Officers visited the school to talk to the children about some of the dangers of being online and the best ways to stay safe. The children had the opportunity to ask questions, and the Officers provided helpful answers and advice. It was a valuable session that gave the children the knowledge they need to navigate the online world safely and responsibly.

They informed the children that from the age of 10 someone can be reported to the police for harrassment if they have targeted another person online, more than once within a 6 month period. Usually police will offer a youth offenders programme or other ways of support before convicting them. The Police also informed the school that there has been a rise in Money Muling amongst young people. Money muling is when someone transfers stolen money through their bank account on behalf of someone else and is paid for doing so. Criminals use money mules to launder the profits of their crimes. Young people are often unaware that acting as a money mule is illegal. They are approached to take part online or in person, including through social media, at school, or through external clubs.

Technology over the Holidays

The holiday period is a great time to take stock of the devices you have and ensure they are set up correctly with parental controls set appropriate for your child.

One frustrating issue is that the available features and how you set devices up differ, so to help parents Internet Matters have a really good, non-techie guides which you can follow as part of their ABC Checklist. ABC stands for:

- A Activate parental controls.
- B Balance screen time.
- C Check and chat.

YEAR 6 JUNIOR CITIZENSHIP WORKSHOP

Earlier this term, Year 6 students visited Shadwell Fire Station to take part in The Junior Citizenship Workshop. They had the chance to learn important life skills from different organizations like the Met Police, London Fire Brigade, London Ambulance Service, and Transport for London. The children took part in fun, interactive activi-



ties that helped them learn how to live safely and responsibly, especially when travelling independently in the city. Growing older comes with many new responsibilities and this day certainly helped the children to be more aware of potential dangers and how best to avoid them.

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NSPCC WORKSHOP

On the 10th December, we were fortunate to be visited by the NSPCC to talk to Year 2, 5 and 6 about 'Speaking Out. Staying Safe.' They met with each year group separately, so the content could be pitched appropriately to the children's age and understanding. Topic included:


- abuse in all its forms and how to recognise the signs of these
- that abuse is never a child's fault and they have the right to be safe

- Before the session, the children had an assembly to go over the key messages and also a work booklet to complete after the workshop to identify who they could talk to if they didn't feel safe.

YEAR 4 SCIENCE PROJECT AT BOW SCHOOL



This half term 4M had the chance to visit Bow School to take part in a science lesson in their science labs! The lesson was run by one of the Bow school teachers, who is also an electrical engineer. The children got to learn more about simple circuits. Looking at the different components in a circuit, as well as the symbols used to represent each of these. Children used these symbols to be able to re-

create a single bulb circuit and a circuit with two bulbs. The children were then able to talk about how in a two bulb circuit the light bulbs had to share the energy, meaning the bulb was less bright. The children really enjoyed their lesson with Mr Siu, and 4D are really looking forward to their visit after the end of term break!

YEAR 6 VISIT THE NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM



Year 6 visited the Natural History Museum this half term to take part in an exciting Evolution Workshop. During the session, the children learned about the fascinating concept of evolution and how animals and plants adapt to their environments over time. They explored different examples of adaptation in the animal kingdom and gained a deeper understanding of how species change and evolve. It was a fantastic learning experience that brought science to life

and sparked lots of curiosity and discussion among the children!

ANII-BULLYING WEEK



Anti-Bullying week took place from Mon 11th—Fri 15th November this year and as ever the school provided a range of activities throughout the week. One focus was helping the children to identify and tackle bullying, using activities such as role play. For children in KS2 there was also an opportunity to create a 'good digital citizen' poster highlighting how to tackle and report bullying online. As the theme this year was 'Choose Respect' the children ended the week by considering what we mean by respect and disrespect, and how upstanding can be used to direct, delegate, distract, delay, and document disrespectful behaviour. Mrs Bowley also led a workshop for



parents, going through the procedures we have in place to support behavior and how we investigate, track, record and report incidents. She also clarified the definition of bullying and how this would include a series of events, rather than a one off incident. During the week we also took part in Odd Sock Day, designed to celebrate our differences. As well as wearing their odd socks, the children also got to take part in an odd sock poster competition, submitting some fantastic entries, some of which can be seen above.

2025 CALENDARS



When making their calendars this year, the children used a variety of different printing techniques. In Reception, the children used shapes to create different patterns and effects. Children in KS1, built on this to

explore different textures and effects using leaf printing. In Year 3, the children made calligraphy printing blocks using a range of different collage materials, such as cotton wool, lolly sticks and bubble wrap. The children in Year 4, used printing blocks made from foam boards. In Year 5, the children used mono printing. And finally in year 6, the children did lino cutting to make printing blocks.







For our Autumn Design and Technology day we focused on Mechanisms. Children across the school focused on different mechanisms, how they work and what they are useful for. As part of their learning, the children in Years 1 to 3 researched, designed and made their own mechanical toys using techcard. Year 4, 5 and 6 used the construction kit 'K'Nex' to build upon their knowledge from previous years, using wheels, axels, linkages, cams and screws. Year 6 even brought in elements of electricity by making desk fans attached to an electric motor! Once the children had finished creating their design, they evaluated their product to see if they could make it even better next time. The children really enjoyed taking part in DT day as they get to explore their creativity, develop their use of tools and materials and gain the knowledge to understand how things work.

At Old Palace we always wish to ensure we are doing the best we can. We therefore buy into Challenge Partners, which provides the school will an annual review carried out by senior school leaders from across the country (copies of our previous reports are available on the school website). This also gives senior leaders from Old Palace the change to review other schools and to learn from their practice. . Over the last few years there has been much debate regarding whether Ofsted is fit for purpose. In our case, the Independent Complaints Adjudication Service for Ofsted (ICASO) found that reading at the school should be re-inspected as the lead inspector had not followed procedure, placing the children at a disadvantage. Despite this ruling, Ofsted chose not to return.

Ofsted now has a new leader, Sir Martyn Oliver, who is looking to make important changto how Ofsted inspects schools. In order to do this, Sir Martin is looking at other models of accountability, such as the reviews carried out by Challenge Partners. To do this, he and his colleague, (who wrote Kirsty Godfrey



the Ofsted English Review) attended the Challenge Partners review of North Primary school in Southall in November, where Mr Palmer was part of the review team. Mr Palmer had the opportunity to observe and feedback on a Maths lesson alongside Sir Martin and on an English lesson with Kirsty. Mr Palmer reported that this was a very positive experience, as he felt that Ofsted took a real interest in how the Challenge Partners process worked and the quality of challenge that it provide to the school being reviewed. It is likely that in January Ofsted will be making an announcement on 'changes to how it inspections schools.

RECEPTION VISIT THE DISCOVERY CENTRE



After an exciting journey on the D8 bus, the Reception children arrived at the Discovery story room. Here, they were introduced to Hootah, and the story of the squigglydiggily. The children were then asked to explore the environment to gain inspiration for creating their very own story. There were letters on the floating clouds high up. There was a miniature mine, where the children put on the lights and found ruby coloured gems. The children ran through the jelly forest and up the ship slide, escaping the pirates. The children enjoyed exploring the book area, and they were mezmerised by the beautiful display of planets and moons high up in the midnight sky. Following their exploration, the children sat together and created their own story. It was great to hear the children sharing all their imaginative ideas, which they later put to good use in their writing, back in the classroom. Well done Reception!

YEAR 1 VISIT THE RAGGED SCHOOL MUSEUM



Our Year 1 children enjoyed a fantastic trip to the Ragged School Museum near Mile End. The children stepped back in time to experience what life was like for Victorian school children. They had the unique opportunity to participate in a traditional Victorian school lesson, sitting at wooden desks and using slate boards. They also got to hear about other artefacts from Victorian times and even got to see a Victorian room! The great learning continued back at school, when parents brought in toys from their childhood for our 'toy museum'. Not only was this great fun, but it also helped the children to develop a sense of chronology. A big thank you to all the parents who took part!

YEAR 5 VISIT THE ROYAL OBSERVATORY

Year 5 were lucky enough to visit the Royal observatory



and Planetarium in Greenwich to support their Science topic on Space & Forces. As they went into the planetarium, the children saw projections and listened to a presentation about our solar system. They saw how the planets orbit the sun and got a

close up view of Venus and Mars, which are rocky planets and of Saturn and Jupiter, which are giant balls of gas. They also got to see how many stars we can see in the universe and tried to imagine how many planets there might be in the universe if every star has at least one planet orbiting it. Before returning to school, they also got to see the meridian line (which represents zero degrees Longitude) at one time, an important navigation tool and the origin of Greenwich Mean Time.

YEAR 3 VISIT GUNNERSBURY MUSEUM



This half term year 3 visited Gunnersbury Museum to help consolidate their learning on Prehistoric Britain. They explored many exhibits including early tools, clothes and even jewellery! The children also got help from the experts at Gunnersbury to build their own Stone Age shelters outside. The children particularly enjoyed using some of the prehistoric hunting tools to try and catch some wild prey. It was a great day, which really helped to bring the children's learning to life.

YEAR 2 VISIT THE TOWER OF LONDON

This half term, Year 2 have been learning about the Stuart era, exploring significant figures and events like the Gunpowder Plot and the Great Fire of London. To enrich their understanding, the children visited the Tower of London, where they had the chance to explore its towers and galleries. Highlights included the Bloody Tower, where Guy Fawkes was imprisoned, the



White Tower, and the Jewel House, home to the Crown Jewels and other historical artefacts. The trip also featured a workshop titled 'Fire, Fire!', where actors brought the events of the Great Fire of London to life.
